Peter Baskerville teaches in the History Department at the University of Victoria. He has just completed a book on the Bank of Upper Canada for the Champlain Society.

Andrew Birrell is Director of the National Photography Collection of the Public Archives of Canada. Author of *Benjamin Baltzly* and co-author of *Canadian Photography 1839-1920*, he has written and lectured widely on early photography in Canada.

Jim Burant is Chief, Collections Management, in the Picture Division, Public Archives of Canada. In addition to several articles, he has published *Friendly Spies* on the Northern tour, 1815-1837 and The Garrison Years: London, Canada West, 1793-1853.
