Catherine Bailey, a Production Coordinator for *Archivaria*, has been an archivist in the Social Affairs and Natural Resources Section, Government Archives Division, National Archives of Canada, Ottawa, since August 1988. She holds an Honours B.A. in Western Canadian history (1986), and a Master of Archival Studies degree (1988), both from the University of British Columbia. Her M.A.S. thesis dealt with the application of archival theory to machine readable records.

Debra Barr is currently employed in the University of Toronto Archives compiling an inventory to the papers of Vincent Massey. She obtained her Master of Archival Studies degree from the University of British Columbia (1985). He received an Honours B.A. degree from the University of Saskatchewan (1969) and an M.A. degree in Canadian History from Carleton University (1973). He has been actively involved in the Association of Canadian Archivists since its founding. He is currently Chairman of the ACA Education Committee, President of the Alberta Society of Archivists, and a member of the Canadian Council of Archives Acquisition Committee. He was previously employed as Coordinator of Records Management for Petro Canada, Calgary (1981-86) and Chief of the Natural Resources Records Section of the Government Archives Division (then Federal Archives Division), National Archives of Canada (1974-81). He co-authored the "Frost-Corbett Report" published in *Archivaria* 17.

Carol Couture est professeur agrégé à l'École de bibliothéconomie et des sciences de l'information de l'Université de Montréal depuis juin 1988. À ce titre, il enseigne à la Spécialisation en archivistique offerte dans le cadre de la Maîtrise en bibliothéconomie et sciences de l'information et il est responsable du programme de Certificat en archivistique. Il est l'auteur de plusieurs articles scientifiques qui ont été publiés dans diverses revues nationales et internationales et il est co-auteur du livre *Les archives au XX^e siècle: une réponse aux besoins de l'administration et de la recherche*, qui a été traduit en anglais et en espagnol. Intéressé par la recherche, il participe à plusieurs projets dont un qui a été subventionné, pour 1989-1990 et 1990-1991, par le Conseil de recherche en sciences humaines du Canada (CRSH) et qui porte sur une étude d'impact de la législation archivistique. Il est aussi membre fondateur du Groupe interdisciplinaire de recherche en archivistique (GIRA).

Barbara L. Craig became the Archivist of York University, Toronto, in January 1989. She was previously the archivist responsible for records of the provincial Ministry of Health, including records of public general hospitals, at the Archives of Ontario. In 1989 she completed a degree in the Doctorate Programme of the School of Library Archive and Information Studies, University of London, England, where her dissertation was entitled "Hospital Records in London, England, and the Province of Ontario, Canada, 1800 to 1950." She is a past president of the Association of Canadian Archivists (1983-84), and is currently Chair of the Publications Committee of ACA, Chairperson of the Ontario Council of Archives, and a Fellow of the Founders College at York University.

Luciana Duranti is Assistant Professor in the Master of Archival Studies programme at the School of Library, Archival, and Information Studies, University of British Columbia, Vancouver, a position she has held since 1 July 1987. Prior to this, she was a Professor in the Special School of Archivists and Librarians at the University of Rome (1982-1987); served as State Archivist in the State Archives of Rome (1978-1982); and Project Archivist for the National Research Council of Italy (1974-1977). Professor Duranti has earned a Doctorate in Arts (1973) and a Master of Archival Studies degree (1975), both degrees from the University of Rome. In addition to teaching three courses in the M.A.S. programme, she is active in several archival and records management associations, and her writings have been published internationally.

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Margery Hadley received an M.A. degree in Canadian Historical Geography from the University of Calgary (1984). She is currently employed as a Project Archivist at the Whyte Museum of the Canadian Rockies, Banff, preparing a guide to the photographic collections.
