In the evenings, **Harold Averill** can often be found at the Canadian Gay Archives, of which he has been President since 1984. During weekdays, however, he is Assistant University Archivist at the University of Toronto Archives, where he has been since 1978.

**Debra Barr**, the Guest Editor of this issue of *Archivaria*, is currently employed in the University of Toronto Archives compiling an inventory to the papers of Vincent Massey. She obtained her Master of Archival Studies degree from the University of British Columbia (1985). She is Chairperson of the Toronto Sub-Committee of the Ontario Association of Archivists' Education Committee. She has compiled a *Guide to the Papers of Earle Birney* for the Thomas Fisher Library, University of Toronto, and a *Guide to the Canadian Manuscripts in Victoria University Library*. Prior to moving to Toronto, she was Archivist of the Anglican Diocese of British Columbia in Victoria, B.C.

**Barbara L. Craig** became the Archivist of York University, Toronto, in January 1989. She worked previously at the Archives of Ontario, where she was the archivist responsible for records of the provincial Ministry of Health, including the records of public general hospitals. In 1989, she completed a degree in the Doctorate Programme of the School of Library Archive and Information Studies, University of London, England; her dissertation was entitled "Hospital Records in London, England and the Province of Ontario, Canada, 1880 to 1950." She is a past president of the Association of Canadian Archivists (1983-84), currently Chair of the Publications Committee of the ACA, Chairperson of the Ontario Council of Archives, and also a fellow of the Founders College at York University. The first part of her study of hospital records appeared in *Archivaria* 29 (Winter 1989-90).

Luciana Duranti is Assistant Professor in the Master of Archival Studies Program at the School of Library, Archival and Information Studies, University of British Columbia, Vancouver, a position she has held since 1 July 1987. Prior to this, she was a Professor in the Special School of Archivists and Librarians at the University of Rome (1982-1987); State Archivist in the State Archives of Rome (1978-1982); and Project Archivist for the National Research Council of Italy (1974-1977). Professor Duranti has earned a Doctorate in Arts (1973) and a Master of Archival Studies degree (1975), both degrees from the University of Rome. In addition to teaching three courses in the M.A.S. programme, she is active in several archival and records management associations, and her writings have been published internationally. The first part of her series on diplomatics appeared in *Archivaria* 28 (Summer 1989).

**Marlene Epp** is currently Research Associate with the Mennonite Historical Society of Canada, assisting in the writing of the third volume of the *History of Mennonites in Canada*. She will receive her M.A. degree in History from the University of Waterloo in 1990, and expects to enter a doctoral programme in Canadian history in September 1990.

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**D'Arcy Hande** is Director of the Saskatoon Office, Saskatchewan Archives Board. He also served as Archivist of the Central Canada Synod, Lutheran Church in America, 1974-1985.

**Marc Lerman** is an Assistant Archivist with the Archives of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Toronto where he has been employed since 1985. He has spoken to various groups on the topics of archives, genealogy, and local church history.

Joy Lowe has been an ordained Spiritualist minister since 1971. She was educated in England in an active Spiritualist environment, since both of her parents were lifetime Spiritualists and church platform workers, and emigrated to Canada in late 1956. Her practicum consisted of working for the Open Door Spiritualist Church in Victoria and the Victoria Healing Centre, and conducting independent Spiritualist study groups. She also studied with the Moody Bible Institute, and with the Church of the Latter Day Saints for two years.

**Carman Miller** has been teaching Canadian History in the Department of History of McGill University, Montreal, since 1967. He has resumed the position of Chairman of the Department which he occupied from 1978 to 1981. In 1980, he published *The Canadian Career of the Fourth Earl of Minto*. He has written extensively on Canada and the South African War.

Walter Meyer zu Erpen holds a B.A. in Canadian history and French (1982) and a Master of Archival Studies (1985), both degrees from the University of British Columbia, and is also a Certified Records Manager. In January 1985, he began work at the British Columbia Records Management Branch as a records analyst. Upon the amalgamation of the Records Management Branch and the Provincial Archives of British Columbia in March 1989, he was appointed Manager of the Appraisal and Acquisition Section of the newly formed British Columbia Archives and Records Service (BCARS). For the past fifteen years, Walter has explored, largely through the Spiritualist church in Canada, the question of personal survival of death and the possibility of spirit communication.

**Elspeth Reid** currently works in the Presbyterian Archives, re-cataloguing the holdings. Previously, she worked at the Law Society of Upper Canada Archives, and has also worked at the United Church Archives and at the Perth District Archives (Scotland). She holds degrees from the Universities of St. Andrews and Guelph, and a Diploma in Archive Administration from University College, London. She is also the compiler of *Sub-Doctoral Theses on Canada*, published by the British Association for Canadian Studies in 1988.

**Erich Schultz** is Librarian of Wilfrid Laurier University, Waterloo, Ontario. He has served as Archivist of the Eastern Synod, Lutheran Church in America, and the Eastern Synod, Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, since 1962.

Stephen Speisman holds a Ph.D. degree in history from the University of Toronto. He is a founding member of the ACA and the Toronto Area Archivists Group, a contributor to the *Dictionary of Canadian Biography*, and *The Canadian Encyclopedia*, and author of *The Jews of Toronto: A History to 1937*, for which he won the City of Toronto Book Award. Since 1973, he has been Director of the Toronto Jewish Congress/Canadian Jewish Congress Ontario Region Archives, the archives of the Jewish community of Ontario.

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**Dr. Shirley Spragge**, Assistant Archivist (Processing) at Queen's University Archives, also looks after the archives of the Anglican Diocese of Ontario, Kingston, as Diocesan Archivist. Her work there has stimulated her interest in religious records and record keeping. She is a contributor to the recent history of the Diocese of Toronto, *By grace co-workers: Building the Anglican Diocese of Toronto 1780-1989* (Toronto: Anglican Book Centre, 1989).

Susan Stanley has been Archivist of the Montreal-Ottawa Conference, United Church of Canada, for fifteen years, and is the editor of its *Guide to Local Church Records, Montreal-Ottawa Conference*.

**Doreen Stephens** became the Archivist for the Anglican Diocese of New Westminster and the Provincial Synod of British Columbia, on 1 January 1986. Prior to that time, she had been a volunteer in the same archives for five years. She holds a degree in education from the University of British Columbia and was a teacher for several years. She is just concluding a term as the Treasurer of the British Columbia Archives Council (BCAC), and is a past secretary of the Religious Archives Special Interest Section of the ACA.

**Bob Stewart** has been the archivist of the British Columbia Conference United Church Archives in Vancouver, B.C., for the last ten years. He attended the National Archives of Canada's Archives Course in 1985, and is currently the chair of the Religious Archives Special Interest Section of the Association of Canadian Archivists.

Shelley Sweeney has been the archivist for the University of Regina for the past seven years. She has a Master of Archival Studies degree (1985) from the University of British Columbia, and is currently the Chair of the ACA Ethics Committee and the University and College Archives Special Interest Section of the ACA.

**Teresa Thompson** has been the Archivist of the General Synod, Anglican Church of Canada, for the past eleven years. Her research for this article was begun while she was on sabbatical leave in 1985. **Garth Walker** became the Archivist of the Anglican Diocese of New Westminster and the Provincial Synod of British Columbia in 1980, upon his retirement after 46 years with Mutual Life. He has been very active in the Anglican Church across Canada, and was primarily responsible for the creation of the network of Anglican archivists in British Columbia. In 1986, he retired as Archivist of the Diocese of New Westminster and of the Provincial Synod of B.C., was named an honourary member of the Association of British Columbia Archivists (ABCA) and became the first chair of the General Synod Archives Committee, serving until 1989. Linda Wicks is an Assistant Archivist with the Archives of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Toronto, where she has been employed since 1986.

Jane V. Zavitz, the Librarian and Quaker Archivist at Pickering College, holds a B.A. degree from Earlham College and an M.L.S. degree from the University of Western Ontario. Her archival training began at the University of Maryland in the summer of 1978, and recently continued through the Ontario Archivists Association's Archival Exchange Program. Active in the Canadian Friends Historical Association, she has completed a "Bibliography and Index of the Quaker Materials at Pickering" with the assistance of an SSHRCC Grant; the disks will be available in the future to institutions as a research tool.
