## Our Contributors

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Hans Booms is a former President of the International Council on Archives, and former President of the Bundesarchiv, Federal Republic of Germany. He is a professor of contemporary history and archival science at Cologne University. A prolific editor and writer, he is one of Europe's foremost archivists.

**David L. Brown** has been an archivist at the National Archives of Canada for the past eleven years, specializing in machine-readable records. Presently he is the Manager of the Geomatics Programme in the Cartographic and Audio-Visual Archives Division, specializing in electronic records used for the production of maps and architectural drawings. A geographer by training (Carleton University), he is the author of numerous studies which examine the settlement of pre-1850 Upper Canada.

Richard Brown has been an archivist at the National Archives of Canada since 1983, where he is now the federal records transportation specialist in the Government Archives Division (GAD). He received a B.A. in Canadian history from the University of New Brunswick (1974) and a Ph.D. in Renaissance History from Edinburgh University (1982). For the past several years he has been involved with several committees developing and refining branch acquisition strategies for public and private sector records in the Historical Resources Branch of the NA.

**Brian Bucknall** is a partner at Osler, Hoskin & Harcourt, a law firm with its principal office in Toronto, Ontario. He taught at Osgoode Hall Law School for several years prior to joining Osler, Hoskin & Harcourt. He practises in the areas of real estate, municipal and planning law and maintains a continuing interest in legal education and legal history. He has been a member of the Board of Directors of the Osgoode Society for several years.

**Terry Cook** is Chief of the Social Affairs and Natural Resources Records Section, Government Archives Division, National Archives of Canada. A former General Editor of *Archivaria*, he remains on its Editorial Board, as well as on those for the Society of American Archivists and *The American Archivist*. His most recent projects include a RAMP study for the International Council on Archives, *The Archival Appraisal of Records Containing Personal Information* (Paris, 1991) and a booklet for the Bureau of Canadian Archivists' Planning Committee on Descriptive Standards, *The Concept of the Archival Fonds*.

Paulette Dozois joined the National Archives of Canada in 1977 and worked for five years in the Prime Ministers' Archives Section of the Manuscript Division with specific responsibility for the papers of Prime Minister Mackenzie King. She joined the Government Archives Division in 1981 as a government records archivist and has had

numerous responsibilities in GAD over the intervening years. Currently she is the archivist for the records of the Departments of External Affairs and International Trade.

Luciana Duranti is Assistant Professor in the Master of Archival Studies Programme at the School of Library, Archival and Information Studies, University of British Columbia, a position she has held since 1 July 1987. Prior to this she was a Professor in the Special School of Archivists and Librarians at the University of Rome (1982-1987); served as State Archivist in the State Archives of Rome (1978-1982); and Project Archivist for the National Research Council of Italy (1974-1977). Professor Duranti has earned a Doctorate in Arts (1973) and a Master of Archival Studies (1975), both degrees from the University of Rome. In addition to teaching three courses in the M.A.S. programme, she is active in several archival and records management associations, and her writings have been published internationally.

**Bruce S. Elliott** is an assistant professor of Canadian History at Carleton University in Ottawa and a graduate of the Department of English Local History at the University of Leicester. He is the author of *Irish Migrants in the Canadas* and *The City Beyond*, a study of the development of the suburban city of Nepean, Ontario.

**Timothy Ericson** is currently Director of the Milwaukee Urban Archives at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, a position he has held since July 1989. Prior to that he was Education Officer of the Society of American Archivists (1987-1989), the University Archivist and Area Research Center Director at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls (1977-1987), and for two years a project archivist and map curator at the State Historical Society of Wisconsin. He received an M.A. in American history from UW-River Falls and an M.L.S. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

**Eldon Frost** has worked with private and government records at the National Archives of Canada since 1968. He is currently Director, Government Archives Division.

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**Robin Higham** is a Professor of Military History at Kansas State University in Manhattan. He is a member of the Military Archives Committee of the International Commission of Comparative Military History, and the author and editor of a number of works including *Official Histories* (1970) and with Donald J. Mrozek, *A Guide to the Sources of U.S. Military History* (1975; and quinquennial supplements).

Candace Loewen has been working with scientific and natural resources records in the Government Archives Division of the National Archives of Canada since 1986. She holds a Master of Arts degree in Canadian history from the University of Ottawa. Candace is best known to readers of *Archivaria* as Book Review Editor.

Steven Maynard is a member of the Department of History, Queen's University, where he teaches a course in comparative working-class history. For the past two years he has co-taught an introductory lesbian and gay studies course at Ryerson Polytechnical Institute and is an active member of the Canadian Lesbian and Gay History Network and the Toronto Centre for Lesbian and Gay Studies. He is presently completing research for a Ph.D. thesis on gay history, masculinity and class in nineteenth and early twentieth-century Ontario.

- **Lorna R. McLean** is a Ph.D. candidate in the Department of History at the University of Ottawa. Her M.A. thesis examined the non-wage labour of working-class women in Ottawa in the late nineteenth century. Her current research focuses on the relationship between law and society in nineteenth-century Ontario.

Having completed the course work in the Master of Archival Studies programme at U.B.C., she is writing her thesis on the Canadian native documentary heritage.

- **Helen W. Samuels** has been Archivist and Head, Special Collections, at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology since 1977. Her research and publications, focusing on the topics of appraisal and documentation strategies, include *Appraising the Records of Modern Science and Technology* (Chicago, 1985). She is a Fellow of the Society of American Archivists.
