Wendy Duff is currently working on her doctorate at the University of Pittsburgh. Previously she has been the Coordinator of Technical Services at the Provincial Library, a teacher in the Nova Scotia Community College Library Technicians Course, and Librarian at the Public Archives of Nova Scotia. She has also taught a course on the Organization of Knowledge at Dalhousie's School of Library and Information Studies. She presently serves as an ACA member on the Planning Committee on Descriptive Standards and on the International Congress of Archives Ad hoc Commission on Descriptive Standards.

Luciana Duranti is Associate Professor in the Master of Archival Studies Programme (MAS) at the School of Library, Archival, and Information Studies, University of British Columbia, a position she has held since 1987. He has worked for the Directorate of History, of the Department of National Defence, and has spent two and a half years as an Access to Information and Privacy Analyst with the National Archives of Canada. Larry J. Hackman is Director of the Harry S. Truman Presidential Library in Independence, Missouri. Previous to this recent appointment, he was Assistant Commissioner for Archives and Records in the New York State Education Department, the home of the State Archives and Records Administration. He was also Executive Officer of the new State Archives Partnership Trust. A Fellow of the Society of American Archivists, Hackman was the first Director of the Records
