E. Michael Attas is a scientist with Atomic Energy of Canada Limited (AECL) at its Whiteshell Laboratories in Pinawa, Manitoba. He received his Ph.D. in archaeology and radiochemistry at McGill University in 1983 and participated in excavations at Senneville, Quebec, Perakhóra, Greece, and Sallèles d’Aude, France. His scientific career has spanned over two decades at AECL and at the National Research Council in Winnipeg. His varied analytical chemistry research activities have resulted in publications in journals including *Nature*, *Biospectroscopy*, *Nuclear Instruments & Methods*, and *Journal of Cultural Heritage*. Dr. Attas has two “day jobs” at AECL, managing the Analytical Science Branch and providing quality assurance expertise to Whiteshell Laboratories staff and projects. In his spare time, he is a board member of the Deep River Science Academy (Whiteshell Campus), promoting the pleasures of a career in science and engineering to young people.

John M. Dirks has held various archivist positions at the Archives of Ontario since 1990. Presently, he is the senior archivist in the Economic Development, Labour and Energy Portfolio, having responsibility for the records of several government ministries along with private fonds relating to business and labour. A graduate of Queen’s University at Kingston, Ontario, he completed his B.A. (Honours) in history and economics in 1986 and his M.A. in history in 1988. More recently, he graduated in 2002 with a Master of Information Studies from the University of Toronto, Faculty of Information Studies.

Robert C. Fisher graduated from the University of Toronto with a B.A. in history and economics in 1988, and from the University of Waterloo with an M.A. in public history in 1990. He was a historian with the Directorate of History at the Department of National Defence from 1990 to 1996, where he was part of a team writing the official history of the Royal Canadian Navy in the Second World War. Since 1996, he has worked as an archivist in the Social and Cultural Archives section of Library and Archives Canada, responsible for

the fonds of individuals and organizations in the area of intellectual life, scholarship, education, and religion. His work has appeared in scholarly journals, including *The Mariner's Mirror*, *The American Neptune*, *Canadian Military History*, *The Northern Mariner*, and in popular magazines, including *The Beaver*, *Family Chronicle*, and *Legion Magazine*.

Jacques Grimard is an associate professor teaching archival sciences at the École de bibliothéconomie et des sciences de l'information, Université de Montréal. He is currently undertaking a major research project on program evaluation in the archival milieu from a theoretical and methodological perspective, and is also playing a leading role in the development of the "portail international archivistique francophone," aimed at facilitating communication of archival knowledge among francophone countries. Dr. Grimard's thirty-year career has been devoted to the management of archival organizations, including Library and Archives Canada, the National Archives of Quebec, and the Centre de recherche en civilisation canadienne-française at the University of Ottawa. He has lectured extensively at universities and conferences in Canada and internationally. At the national level, he has brought his expertise to task forces and working groups dealing with key archival issues. At the international level, he has served as Secretary of the International Conference of the Round Table on Archives and has chaired several committees of the International Council on Archives. He is the author of several books and articles in history and archival sciences.

Tom Nesmith is an associate professor at the University of Manitoba, and founder and director of the university's master's program in archival studies in the Department of History. He also served as an associate dean of arts at the University of Manitoba from January 2001 to June 2004. Prior to joining the faculty at the University of Manitoba, he was an archivist at Library and Archives Canada from 1978 to 1990. He was editor of *Archivaria* from 1984 to 1986 and continues to serve as a member of its editorial board. Among other editing and publishing activities, he edited and contributed to *Canadian Archival Studies and the Rediscovery of Provenance* (1993), a joint publication of the Association of Canadian Archivists (ACA) and the Society of American Archivists. He is a member of the ACA's Education Committee, the City of Winnipeg Records Committee, and the Saskatchewan Archives Board. He holds a Ph.D. in Canadian history from Carleton University.

Ellen Scheinberg holds a B.A. (Honours) and an M.A. in history from Queen's University. She is currently working on her Ph.D. in history at the University of Ottawa. Ms. Scheinberg worked as a senior archivist with the Government Archives Division of Library and Archives Canada from 1990 until the spring of 2000. She spend some time working as an information man-

agement consultant. She then took a year off, beginning in the spring of 2001, to undertake research on her thesis, with support from a Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada award. From October 2002 to the present, she has been the director of the Ontario Jewish Archives. During her career, she has published articles in the areas of women's history and archival studies in various Canadian journals, scholarly magazines, and books, and has given presentations at archival and historical conferences across the country.

Elizabeth Yakel is an assistant professor at the University of Michigan School of Information in the Archives and Records Management specialization. Her current research focuses on access and accessibility to primary sources and explores the information seeking patterns of researchers and the design of access systems. She has published in the top archival journals and her articles include: "The Social Construction of Accountability: Radiologists and their Recordkeeping Practices" (*The Information Society*, 2001) and "Archival Representation" (*Archival Science*, forthcoming). Dr. Yakel is also active in the Society of American Archivists where she has served on the governing Council and was elected Fellow in 1999.
